Day 20, Friday, August 25th — Discover Purpose

Then Jesus told his disciples, "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world and forfeits his soul? Or what shall a man give in return for his soul?"

Matthew 16:24-26 ESV

Over the years, I have volunteered in various ways for my church and my community—when asked. I guess I don't think of these little volunteer jobs as my purpose, because I still pray—Father, what are my spiritual gifts? What is my purpose? Do you have the same questions? Are you praying for God to reveal your spiritual purpose?

Service is about lifting up others. Service isn't about doing something extraordinary. Service is serving God and that privilege is both humbling and extraordinary!

What shall we give in return for our soul? Anything and everything!
